WELLINGTON COLLEGE GROUNDS



On Tuesday 25th June at 6pm 14 ladies met at Wellington College for a tour of the College Gardens by Mark. It was a thoroughly interesting walk around and as it was such a hot evening, Mark adapted the tour to try and keep us in the shade. We started off by visiting the Living Legacy Garden which was a show garden at the 2015 RHS Chelsea Flower Show which was built to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the Battle of Waterloo. The garden aimed at reminding today's generation of the huge significance the battle had in shaping Britain and Europe as we know it. Also, as this legacy that the Duke of

Wellington left behind in his living memorial, Wellington College. The different areas of

the garden represented different parts of the conflict. The first part was the conflict and then you have plants growing and out of the gates is new oaks that are planted for new growth.

We walked along a woodland path that then brought us out into a clearing of wonderful trees and grass and a tulip tree. This area is not open for students to go into. Then we moved to see the theatres and planted gardens. There was a Chinese Garden feature. Outside the Maths area a garden had been created with shapes and the PI symbol made out of wood.





Mark talked to us about the trees and layout of the avenues of trees. We then progressed onto the lake which Mark says is not very deep and eventually feeds into the Blackwater River. They have lots of wildlife on it and have traps set up to catch

cray fish which Mark lifted a trap out to show us.

Mark explained all the gardeners have their own area to look after and also a house block too. One person is responsible for the Headmaster's garden which is on site.

Thank you to Mark and for

everyone turning up for an interesting evening.
